Credit Classes - Registration Information

Getting registered for Western classes is a simple process.

- If you are a **part-time** (11 or fewer credit hours) student, come in, call, mail, or use the computer to register. Payment is due at the time of registration.
- If you are going to be a **degree seeking or full**time student, make sure you have:
 - Applied and been accepted for admission to the college.
 - Taken COMPASS Placement Tests or provided documentation of minimum ACT or SAT score
 - Met with your academic advisor. Contact Yvonne Putnam for an appointment.

Other things to note:

- Forms may be picked up from and returned to the WWCC Outreach Office in Star Valley or Cokeville.
 - Students may be placed on a waitlist if a course is full. When a seat becomes available, the student will be sent an e-mail notifying them that a seat has become available. They'll have three days to add the course. NOTE: Being on a waitlist does not complete the registration process.
 - It is extremely important that you check your class schedule for accuracy. This is available on your Mustang WebAdvisor Account. For specifics, call the Outreach office.

We encourage you to register early so that we can make good decisions about the need to cancel classes because of low enrollment!

Auditing a Course

Any student may sign up for a credit course with a no credit option. You may attend the class and choose whether you do assignments, take tests and complete projects. No grade is issued under this option. **The cost is the same per credit hour rate**. Decisions to take courses for audit must be made within the first seven days of the course.

Placement Tests

Western requires students enrolling in English, math and Government to take the COMPASS placement test. This is a national standardized test designed to help students succeed in College-level coursework. COMPASS scores place you at the correct level in Western courses. If you have designated ACT or SAT individual test scores, you may be exempt from the placement tests. Please contact the office for more information.

The COMPASS placement tests will be given at the WWCC Outreach Office. Please call 886-3834 for dates and times.

Refunds

Student Services and Financial Aid Western Wyoming Community College provides a number of services to you here in Star Valley and Cokeville. You can:

Remember students are responsible for adhering to all College regulations. The best place to find information on various rules is the College catalog. It's our contract with you. Please stop in and pick one up.

Getting Financial Assistance

Students enrolled in a **minimum of six credits** at Western Wyoming Community College are encouraged to apply for financial aid. Some students enrolled in less than 6 hours may also be eligible for financial aid. There are generally two types of aid available at WWCC: aid based on assessed financial need and aid awarded based on academic excellence or area of major.

Students interested in Federal Aid or WWC Foundation grants must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Applications can be accessed from the WWCC Financial Aid webpage. Before financial aid awards will be disbursed, students must have applied and been accepted for admission, and be degree seeking at WWCC.

April 1 is the priority deadline for financial aid at WWCC. Applications received by this date will receive priority consideration for available monies. Applications received after that date will be processed as the file is completed.

Financial Aid Awards may consist of a combination of the following:

Federal Aid Programs:

Federal Pell Grant – Federal grant money based on need available to qualifying students attending an approved post-secondary institution.

Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG) - Federal grants available to students with the lowest expected family contribution.

Academic Competitiveness Grant (ACG) - Federal grants available to PELL eligible students that completed an approved rigorous high school program.

Federal Stafford Loans:

- Subsidized Loans Need-based federally subsidized loans available to college students which are made by the U.S. Department of Educaiton. Current interst rate is fixed at 6.8%, and repayment obligations begin six months after the student completed their education or stops attending on a part-time basis. Entrance and exit counseling is required in order to receive these funds.
- *Unsubsidized Loans* Non-need based Federal loans available to college students which are made by the U.S. Department of Educaiton. Interest rate is fixed at 6.8%, and repayment obligations begin six months after the student completed their education or stops attending on a part-time basis. Entrance and exit counseling is required in order to receive these funds.

Federal PLUS Loans – Federal loans available to parents whose children attend post-secondary institutions. Interest rate is fixed at 8.5%. Repayment begins immediately after loan disbursement.

Scholarship Opportunities:

Western offers a variety of scholarships to High School Seniors based on academic excellence. They include the Superior Student Scholarship, Honor Scholarship, Performance Scholarship, Opportunity Scholarship (award includes state of Wyoming funds for Hathaway eligible students), and Competition and Special Ability Grants. Divisional Scholarships are available to sophomore students. Scholarships are also available to qualifying transfer, part-time and non-traditional students.

WWC Foundation Aid:

Grants provided through donor participation, ranging in value from \$250-\$2500 per academic year.

General Information

How do I buy my books?

Textbooks for local classes are <u>no</u> <u>longer</u> available through the WWCC Outreach office in Star Valley or Cokeville. You are responsible for purchasing books directly from the WWCC Bookstore. Order on-line at www.wwccbookstore.com

What are the rules about attending class?

Each instructor sets his or her own attendance policy. Instructors may drop students from class for excessive absenteeism. It is in your best interest to attend class regularly. The number one reason students fail classes is lack of attendance and subsequent lack of understanding of expectations and deadlines for assignments. If you must miss class for some reason, let your instructor know. If you are going to miss for an extended period, call the WWCC Outreach Office, 886-3834.

How do I drop or withdraw from classes?

Students must sign an add/drop form or use Mustang WebAdvisor by the established drop deadline in order to drop or withdraw from a course. The signed add/drop form must be submitted to the Outreach Office. Check with the office for drop dates. Complete withdrawals (dropping all courses) cannot be done online. Contact the Outreach Office.

What do I do if I have concerns about a class?

You should contact your Outreach Office and after talking with them, if you still have concerns, contact Student Learning, (307) 382-1617 on campus.

How do I get a transcript from Western?

You may pick up a form from the Outreach Office, call (307-382-1637), fax (307-382-1636), or request online (www.wwcc.wy.edu, Registration & Records). There is no charge for transcripts.

How do I find out what I still need to graduate from Western?

Contact Yvonne Putnam in the Outreach Office. She will do an initial degree check for you and send it to campus. An official check can then be done. You should apply for graduation the semester prior to the semester you plan to complete. This gives you time to make adjustments the last semester if needed.

WWCC encourages you to attend the on-campus Graduation Ceremony (Commencement) held each year in May.

HISTORY OF THE U.S. WEST

– Dr. Gus Gertsch – Credit 3 – HIST 1290

This course deals with the West in general with emphasis placed on the trans-Mississippi West. Particular attention will be paid to comparative frontiers, the influence of the frontier on the development of the American character, and to the post-frontier West. Topics include an introduction to functions and relations, solving quadratic equations, rational expressions and equations, radical expressions and equations, solving inequalities, and graphing. Does not fulfill WWCC math requirement. NURSE ASSISTANT

- Jeanelle Livingston, RN, BSN - Credit 4

- NRST 1510

This course prepares a person to work as a nursing assistant. The course presents basic nursing assistant principles and skills, with an emphasis on the elderly client. Opportunities are provided for practice and demonstration of skills in the laboratory related to client care. Students will participate in clinical experience at health care agencies. Satisfactory completion of the course entitles the student to take a competency exam to become certified in the State of Wyoming. Prerequisite: Healthcare Provider CPR, TB Skin Test and MMR (Measles, Mumps, Rubella) Immunizations.

- Dahl Simpson - Credit 3 - COSC 1200 Students will be introduced to the basic functions of the computer and Microsoft Office 2007. This introductory, lecture/lab course provides students with a basic understanding and experience with computers. Hands-on experience will be provided through lab activities. This course is designed for the first-time user. Topics such as the following will be included: hardware, software, operating systems, communications, information systems, buying computers, and workplace issues. - Alan Stauffer - Credit 3 - POLS 1000

This course provides a basic introduction to government and politics in the United States. Successful completion of this course will satisfy the Wyoming state requirement for instruction in the laws and government of Wyoming and the United States. The course is a survey of national, state, and local government. Topics will include U.S. and state constitutions, democratic theory, federalism, political culture, political socialization, public opinion, political participation, electoral behavior, political parties and interest groups, press, and local government. The course also looks at institutional elements of the American political system: legislature, executive, judiciary, and bureaucracy. Also offered is a critical examination of rights, duties, responsibilities, and accountability expected of citizens and elected officials within a democracy. - Jeanelle Livingston - Credit 1 - HLTK 1650 This course builds upon the current Lay-Rescuer CPR certification, which includes Adult, Child, Infant. This course prepares you to fulfill the role as professional rescuer. This Advanced CPR course is required for all Professional Rescuers and Health Care Providers. Adult, child and infant skills will be reviewed and practiced. This course includes 2-man training, mask practice and the proper use of BVM (Bag Valve Mask). The student will be able to pass all skills taught in the course in addition to a written exam. A BLS-for Health Care Providers Card will be issued upon successful completion of requirements according to the American Heart Association. This course includes AED (Automated External Defibrillation) training and Certification. 

NOTIFICATION OF STUDENT RIGHTS UNDER THE FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT

FERPA (also known as the Buckley Amendment) was originally passed in 1974. It has been amended several times since, but the essence remains unchanged. Primary rights for students under FERPA include:

- Right to inspect and review educational records within 45 days of the day the request is received. Submit your request in writing to the Registration & Records office.
- Right to seek to amend educational records. If you think that something in your file is inaccurate, you may make a written request to have that record changed.
- Right to have some control over the disclosure of information from educational records except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.
- Right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by WWCC to comply with the requirements of FERPA.

Directory Information

Western has identified the following information as directory information, meaning we will release it if the student has granted permission on the application for admission or registration information sheet: Major, Dates of Attendance, Class last used within on-line courses, Full-time or Part-time, Degrees/Awards, Participation in officially recognized activities and sports, and height of athletes. All releases are based in the privacy code attached to the student. Under no circumstances are social security number or other identifying student numbers released. If there are any questions about the law and how we adhere to it, the Vice Present for Student Success Services is WWCC's designated FERPA officer.
